## ACCOUNTABILITY

In 2006 the La Center School Board chose to make a change in the way they governed the district. The goal of the Board was a higher degree of accountability in their service to the stakeholders of the district. With that in mind, the Board went to a system of Policy Governance, using the Carver Model as a guideline. Under Policy Governance the Board has created and published an Annual Agenda, which includes meetings with stakeholders. Each fall the Board holds a Community Town Hall to provide an open forum for discussion of topics ranging from over-crowding solutions to graduation requirements. Each spring the Board meets separately with both staff and students to gather their input on needs of the district. These meetings have proved to be very beneficial and have led the district in academic directions that are a direct result of student input.

In addition, Policy Governance requires a high degree of accountability from the superintendent via monitoring reports about specific compliance with Board expectations district wide. All of this requires the explicit expression of Board expectations *in writing* allowing for a higher degree of continuity of purpose in the event of changes in board personnel or the superintendent. This process has helped staff determine areas of both strengths and weaknesses resulting in improved performances across the board. In addition, the ability to be proactive vs. reactive has created strong bonds of trust between all stakeholders. That trust, exhibited by the creation of “maneuver boxes” for staff & students is spawning creative ideas for dealing with old problems. People feel “free” to take responsibility for making suggestions, sharing ideas and working collaboratively rather than just looking to non-specific remedies such as needing more “time or money”. The La Center School District is moving toward the accomplishment of our Mission with “revolutionary” speed. ## **STRATEGIES FOR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT**

At the elementary level we are looking closely at assessing student skill levels in math and reading. Our philosophy is that students struggling in skill development should receive support. This effort to support students in their individual need continues to be our focus. Teachers are finding that learning what the needs of their students are is resulting in opportunities for them to become better teachers.

Middle School continues to work to improve learning environments, improve parent communication and support groups, create a school wide and community support system for struggling students, especially in the area of mental health and improve the efficiency of emergency procedures.

High School goals include improving student, parent and teacher communications, improving student awareness of and reduce incidents of bullying and harassment and improving student learning through varied approaches of student to student interactions and higher cognitive demand within each classroom.
