As a new program, the **Linx Pathway** is proving to be successful for many students and others are still finding their way. Students in the Linx Pathway are working on the 20 credit requirement for the Washington State Diploma. Students work independently on the courses they need to complete in order to meet all requirements. We are finding that few students are able to work on 6 classes at once, so we have reduced the number of courses they are working on at any given time, yet many are completing those classes and then moving onto the next class. Keeping their focus on the few classes has helped them feel that they are accomplishing the goal, just in a different way. We are also putting into place a reward system that recognizes student successes, helps with organizational skills and achievements.

I also would like to thank John Schroder, basketball coach, and Josh Soske, volunteer, for their many hours each week that they are working side by side with a couple of our students. The one-to-one relationship that is forming has helped the students make gains in their work. This mentoring idea is working and we hope to expand upon it in the coming weeks.

School Improvement Goals

The Building Council and staff have been working thoughtful throughout the year during after school meetings, RSLSA time on Wednesday mornings and in our Professional Development meetings. Below are the goals we have set for the school year which will continually be the focal point of our decisions. The SMART goals clearly show timelines in our work, which I will be able to report to you throughout the school year. So far we have recognized a plagiarism program that is free to those teachers wanting to use it. Also the lunch program has been set into place and working very well. No child will go hungry at LCHS! Many other items are in place and will be shared as we complete the data and/or apply to our work.

Athletics & Activities

The Fall Sports Season has come to an end. It was a great season full of success. I think the most important success was being able to host HS games at the High School on their own field. Chess Team

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Teachers- Teri Newman, science teacher, has applied for another M.J. Murdock Partners in Science Supplemental Award Program

titled *Inquiry into Water Quality in a Section of the East Fork of the Lewis River*. *Investigations into the Invertebrate Communities of the East Fork of the Lewis River* has been received by the Trust. A review committee will look at it in January with the results forwarded to the Murdock Trustees in late February. We will have the final outcome in March. Teri has just completed the last grant she received which provided wonderful opportunity for our students and her own studies. This upcoming grant will focus on the research our students will do in the wetlands below the Elementary School. The grant comes with a \$5,000 fund for supplies such as microscopes and other tools, and LCHS will contribute \$2,000 to enhance the work our students will have the opportunity to learn from her work. This is a great opportunity and we are looking forward to the results in March.

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Students – I'm putting this information in this category because it is a wonderful service that will benefit our students. Joyce London,

the Director of Child and Family Services from the Cowlitz County Guidance Association has notified us that we have been approved to have a therapist on board that will provide therapy one day a week to those students and families that qualify for the services, at school. Her name is Tina Fish and she will be working with about 10 - 12 students each week. This opportunity for mental health counseling is wonderful. The program will begin December 4^{th} . This has come to us with the hard work out counselors have done this year. Bravo!

College Fair on November 6th was hit! Over 200 hundred people attended the event, bringing families with students in grades 6-12. The first 45 minutes, students and parents met with college representative from 12 different schools. Also we had 25 schools represented from the students that had done their research from the College Prep class, as part of their work they are doing on colleges. I was very pleased with the work and depth of knowledge our students had about the universities they represented. Students and parents then had an opportunity to attend three different workshops which gave everyone a better understanding of what to expect as a student get closer to their graduation date. A big 'thank you' to our students from the College Prep class, the College and Career Specialist, Aften Pankiewicz-Waldram, and our counselors Timm DiStefano and Kristin Krem.

The **Veteran's Day Assembly,** organized by the freshman class officers with the help of Mrs. Karen Gozart, did a fantastic job. Guest speakers were Tod Surdam and Tony Davis. Debbie Kreiger from the Ladies Auxiliary Yacolt VFW presented Kellan Sullivan and Jacob Granneman with first place awards in their Veterans Day writing contest. We had more veterans than we ever had before, showing students the importance of supporting our nation through recognition of our local veterans from the various types of military branches.
