Wonder Woman attends the middle school and recently shared that she won 4 Medals at her swim meet in Tacoma and has qualified for state coming up at the Federal Way Aquatics Center.

Karla Karukas has been working for three years to give voice to one of our non-verbal students (Wolverine) at LCHS. Whether through her conversation on a daily basis, cooking or work experience, Wolverine has been surrounded by a rich vocabulary and spoken word. Recently Karla decided to give Wolverine a camera to document a day in his life and build a scrapbook with those pictures. The Wolverine reminds me as a matter of routine that there are many ways we can communicate with those with which we work and play.

Reinforcing that our learning comes in all shapes and sizes, Teresa Warnke - Pre-School Teacher, was able to link her lesson on tools and construction within her Neighborhood Unit by using Herm and Robert in our maintenance department. Students were able to take a field trip out to see the tractors and tools in the shop. Students were very excited about this "field trip" and Herm and Robert were wonderful with the kids.

Transition - 5th to 6th & 8th to 9th

Interdistrict Collaboration:

On Friday April 22nd we are teaching a CPI, Non-Violent Crisis Intervention, class available to paraeducators and teachers alike from La Center. Next week Woodland is hosting a regional Speech and Language Pathologist Meeting.
